<u>Workshop: Engaging with Religious and Cultural Diversity – 10 to 12 October 2017</u>

A training program 'Engaging with Religious and Cultural Diversity' was facilitated by Farkhanda Chaudhry MBE from 10 – 12 October at The Multi-Faith Multicultural Centre, PLLCA. From Glasgow, Scotland, with family roots in Pakistan, Ms Chaudhry had conducted two training sessions in Brisbane in 2015. This time the coordinating group for her visit, Believing Women for a Culture of Peace (BWCP), offered first priority to interested people in Toowoomba

and the Gold Coast. The program was originally developed in a number of European countries over four years and has been delivered in a wide variety of contexts. It aims to address the challenge of how to respect the development of individual religious and cultural identities and at the same time to confront prejudice and discrimination. The 19 participants in the Toowoomba session represented a wide variety of faith perspectives, cultural backgrounds and life experience. The interactive nature of the program and the trust developed among the participants enabled these to be shared to the enrichment of all. At the end of the session, all the indications were that many if not all the participants would keep in touch and continue to celebrate their relationships and develop their insights.
